Her bishop and even the pope tried to force the religious order she co-founded with Saint Francis, the *Order of the Poor Ladies* (now known as the *Poor Clares*) to hold property rather than remain poor. Clare insisted on following the path of total poverty set by Francis.

Another time, raiders were preparing to attack the monastery of San Damiano, home to Clare and her sisters. Clare, who was ill at the time, rose from her bed and went to the Chapel, took Jesus in the Holy Eucharist from the tabernacle, and then went to a window where the invaders had already placed a ladder.
